Chinese Nationals Take Red Outpost

NANKING, July 25.—Government troops have opened a large scale six-fronted attack along an 80-mile front and have captured Linpi, one of the major Communist-held cities. The Communist New China News Agency said today.

Linpi is 55 miles southwest of Hsueh-chow, center of the line running north and south along which the Government troops are advancing. At the same time the Government troops have intensified their drive to the east along the Lunghai Railway from Hsueh-chow, aimed at restoring the entire rail line to the sea, the Agency said.
