

PUBLIC CAN VIEW FLEET ON NAVY DAY

Ships in New York Area to Be Open to Visitors Tomorrow, Sunday and Monday

Ships of the Atlantic Fleet assigned to the New York area for the observance of Navy Day will be open to the public tomorrow, Sunday and Monday between 9 A. M. and 11:30 A. M. and 1 P. M. and 4 P. M., the Navy announced yesterday.

The day will be marked by a parade in Brooklyn on Sunday and memorial services at the Naval Hospital, St. Albans, today and Sunday.

The Brooklyn parade will form up at Borough Hall at 11 A. M. and will proceed through Fulton Street, Flatbush Avenue and the Grand Army Plaza. Leading military and civic figures including J. Vincent Keogh, United States Attorney for the Eastern District of New York will review the marchers.

Mr. Keogh, who is chairman of the Citizens Committee for the observance of Navy Day, announced that additional ceremonies will be held Monday at 12:30 P. M. on the steps of Borough Hall, Brooklyn.

At the exercises addresses will be made by Borough President John Cashmore and Rear Admiral Ralph S. Riggs, commandant of the Philadelphia Naval Base.

In outlining the visiting program for naval vessels in the area the Navy pointed out that the public would be permitted aboard ships in the New York Naval Shipyard, Brooklyn, and its annex at Bayonne, N. J., only tomorrow.

Small boats will carry visitors to ships anchored in the North River, it was explained, from two landings at Seventy-second Street and 125th Street, beginning at 8:45 each morning and 12:45 each afternoon. The last boats carrying visitors to the ships during the morning hours will leave the landings at 10:45 A. M. and the last trips in the afternoon will be made at 3:15.

Gangways of ships moored at piers also will be closed at 10:45 A. M. and at 3:15 P. M., allowing late visitors ample time to inspect the vessels. Visitors must be off the vessels at 11:30 each morning and at 4 each afternoon.

LONDON, Oct. 24—As part of Sunday's United States Navy Day

observance the recently commissioned 6,000-ton anti-aircraft cruiser USS Spokane will make a five-day courtesy visit to London. Anchoring tomorrow in the Thames off the Royal Naval College at Greenwich, it will be the first American warship to call at the port of London.

On Monday Admiral Richard L. Connolly, commander of United States naval forces in Europe and the twelfth fleet, will take over the Spokane as his flagship.
