The Honorable Dr. Matthew Fogg

Law enforcement Officers take an oath to uphold the laws of the land by any means necessary at any given time. This means that law Officers may have to report colleagues who are breaking the law. But the ever-present internal culture also, known as the 'blue wall of silence' dictates that law Officers who report wrongdoing by other law Officer's will face career destruction and/or have their lives jeopardized by the same colleagues who will protect the internal culture of indifference. Therefore, the question becomes should law enforcement Officers remain silent amid wrongdoing or blow-the-whistle knowing the severe internal consequences he or she may face.

Dr. Matthew Fogg is a native of Washington, DC. who grew up on Capitol Hill in the shadow of the Lincoln Memorial and the Civil Rights movement. He was present at Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s iconic speech, "I have a dream" in August 1963. Dr. Fogg has a B/S in Criminal Justice from Marshall University and an 'Honorary' Doctorate from Global Oved Seminary & University (GODSU.org). He retired (32 years) as a highly decorated Chief Deputy in the U.S. Marshals Service (USMS) who won a landmark 1998 (<a href="https://rb.gy/bsrqg">https://rb.gy/bsrqg</a>) Title VII Civil Rights verdict [ Matthew Fogg v Janet Reno ] in the DC U.S. District Court for race discrimination by his employer the USMS supervised by the U.S. Department of Justice (<a href="https://rb.gy/ecfuz">https://rb.gy/bsrqg</a>) Today he is the named Class Agent [Matthew Fogg, et.al. v Merrick Garland / U.S. Attorney General] representing (<a href="https://rb.gy/wrvc9">https://rb.gy/wrvc9</a>) potentially 10,000 Complainants since 1994. He is a NASA honored (<a href="https://rb.gy/79j18">https://rb.gy/79j18</a>) 'First Responder' on 9/11 at the World Trade Center's @ 'Ground Zero' in New York City. He co-chaired the 'NOFEAR' civil rights group that directed U.S. Congress to promulgate the 'NoFEAR ACT' (<a href="https://rb.gy/k202s">https://rb.gy/k202s</a>) signed into law by President George Bush on May 15, 2002.

Dr. Fogg led the USMS SWAT Team in response to the Rodney King riots in Los Angeles; the Atlanta Penitentiary Hostage crisis; Protection for Federal Judges on high profile trials; The United Nations General Assembly security for high profile foreign dignitaries; He led the capture of five major fugitives featured in USMS offices nationwide and the TV program 'Americas Most Wanted' (<a href="https://rb.gy/60b5d">https://rb.gy/60b5d</a>).

He was cross-designated a supervisor for both, the US Marshals, and a DEA Special Agent (<a href="https://rb.gy/0c3re">https://rb.gy/0c3re</a>) conducting multi-state police Dragnets that apprehended hundreds more notorious fugitives in Americas 'War On Drugs & Guns and International Fugitives'. His colleagues soon named him "Batman in Gotham City". He is a former National Vice President (VP) for Blacks In Government achieving its highest award titled, "The Honorable" (BIGNET.org) and the first and only male VP ever elected for Federally Employed Women (<a href="https://rb.gy/mngm1">https://rb.gy/mngm1</a>).

Dr. Fogg is a national speaker for Law Enforcement Action Partnerships (LEAP.org) and a former Board Member for Amnesty International USA. He received the NAACP 'Barrier Breaker' award presented by U.S. Congressional House Speaker Nancy Pelosi (<a href="https://rb.gy/tn8lu">https://rb.gy/tn8lu</a>) for blowing-the-whistle on rogue law enforcement, wining a landmark civil rights victory against the mighty US Department of Justice and, for his 'Equal Employment Opportunity' success representing many government workers (<a href="https://rb.gy/2il70">https://rb.gy/2il70</a>) nationwide. He campaigned for public office in Maryland's 4th District for U.S. Congress. Dr. Fogg is a guest law enforcement analyst for CNN, MSNBC, RT, CSPAN and many other news networks and was featured on the 1-23-22, front page (<a href="https://rb.gy/4b876">https://rb.gy/4b876</a>) of the Washington Post Newspaper.
